

# CHANGE YOUR ADDRESS

WITH U.S. IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT (ICE) AND THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE FOR IMMIGRATION REVIEW (EOIR) IMMIGRATION COURT

### UPDATE YOUR ADDRESS SO YOU DON'T MISS YOUR APPOINTMENTS OR COURT DATE

To ensure the best outcome for your case, you have to keep your address current with ICE and the Immigration Court. You should notify within 5 days of your move but if you didn't, you still can.

## Remember, you are required to:

- Know where your local ICE office is located
- Go to all scheduled appointments with your Deportation Officer and go to all Immigration Court hearings
- Keep all immigration paperwork
- Provide your correct or new address to the local ICE Office
- Provide your correct or new address to the Immigration Court





#### A Change of Address form

To change your address with the Immigration Court by mail, you must file Form EOIR-33, available at the local Immigration Court and online at <a href="https://www.justice.gov/eoir/form-eoir-33-eoir-immigration-court-listing">https://www.justice.gov/eoir/form-eoir-33-eoir-immigration-court-listing</a> You must do this within 5 days of moving to a new address.

# What do I do?

OMB# 1125-8004 Alien's Change of Address Form Immigration Court

- 1. Complete the Change of Address form (Form EOIR-33) and make three additional copies.
- \* 2. Mail the original Change of Address form to the Immigration Court. (*This can also be completed online at https://www.justice.gov/eoir/form-eoir-33-eoir-immigration-court-listing*)
  - \* 3. Mail a copy of your completed Change of Address/Contact Information Form (EOIR 33) to the DHS ICE Office of the Principal Legal Advisor (OPLA) that is closest to the court. Addresses for DHS ICE OPLA Field Locations where copies can be mailed or delivered in-person are available online at <a href="https://www.ice.gov/contact/legal">https://www.ice.gov/contact/legal</a>.
    - 4. Provide one copy of the Change of Address Form to your ICE Officer at check-in.
    - 5. Keep one copy of the Change of Address form in a safe place for your records.
    - 6. You will need to complete a Change of Address form for each member of your family who is in Immigration Court proceedings.
  - \* You should send the documents via certified mail so you have proof that you sent them. This means that you request a receipt be returned to you as proof that you sent the documents. You can send certified mail from any post office.

After you have sent the documents keep calling 1-800-898-7180

to verify the date and location of your next hearing before the Immigration Court.
