Facility Snapshot/Description

The Baker County Detention Center operates under the authority of the Baker County Sheriff's Office. The facility is located approximately 45 miles west of Jacksonville in rural Macclenny, Florida.

The facility houses ICE detainees of all custody levels. ICE detainees are housed separately from detainees from other jurisdictions in two-person or four-person cells. Detainees are permitted to be out of their cells the majority of the day socializing in the dayroom or enjoying other indoor recreational activities. The dayrooms are equipped with televisions, cards and board games, kiosks, telephones, and exercise equipment. An outdoor recreation area is also available which provides detainees with sunlight and fresh air. ICE personnel maintain an office in the facility and are available to the detainees daily.

The inspection team visited the ICE detainee housing units numerous times during the inspection observing detainees interacting with each other and with facility staff. Detainees were relaxed and spoke to the inspectors without hesitation. Detainees were interviewed in groups and in a private, confidential setting. LEP detainees were interviewed by a bilingual inspector or via a telephonic translation service. The detainees voiced no concerns regarding their safety. They stated that they are treated with respect by facility staff.

During detainee interviews, several medical concerns were voiced. Each detainee's medical record was reviewed and in each case the detainee had already been evaluated and was receiving treatment. In two of the cases the detainees were being treated by community physician specialists.

Concerns were expressed by several detainees regarding the amount of food provided on the satellite trays. The menus have been analyzed by a registered dietitian and certified to be nutritionally adequate and meet the recommended dietary requirements (RDA). Observation of the food tray makeup operation revealed portion sizes were consistent with the dietitian approved menu.

All areas of the facility were visited and found to be secure, properly ventilated, well-lit, and with sanitation levels being maintained at above average levels. The housing units were observed to be clean and graffiti free. Hot water temperatures were observed to be maintained within industry standards. An in-



spection of the facility overall reflected a positive environment and no issues being noted with the conditions of confinement.

The facility does not charge co-pays for medical, mental health, or dental care. Health services are provided by Armor Correctional Health Services. Food service operations are provided by Trinity Services Group. All other services are provided by Baker County employees.

Areas of Concern/Significant Observations

There were no areas of concern or significant observations during the inspection.

Recommended Rating and Justification

The Lead Compliance Inspector recommends that the facility receive a rating of Acceptable. The facility complies with the ICE National Detention Standards (NDS/SAAPI 2011). No (0) standards were found Deficient and two (2) standards were Not Applicable (N/A). All remaining thirty-seven (37) standards were found to be in compliance.
