Comments: The Sexual Abuse and Assault Prevention and Intervention Standard was inspected during this inspection but is not referenced in the Standards Review Summary Report. The Standard was rated as Meets Standard for this inspection.

Since the last inspection there have been seven allegations of detainee-on-detainee sexual assault or abuse. Following an investigation, one was substantiated and six were unfounded. For the substantiated allegation, the detainee was referred for prosecution and was sentenced to five years in the Florida Department of Corrections. There were no allegations of staff-on-detainee sexual assault or abuse.

There were five ICE detainee hunger strikes. Two hunger strikes were of two days duration; one of three days duration; one of four days duration; and one of ten days duration. Per the HSA, all the detainees were protesting their detention and none required treatment outside the facility. The detainee on a hunger strike for ten days was released at the conclusion of the hunger strike.

There were no ICE detainee suicides but one serious attempt as follows. A 28-year-old Jamaican male was admitted to the facility on 3/16/2018. At the time of admission, he reported no mental health history and taking no medications. On 6/23/2018, while in disciplinary segregation, the detainee tied a bedsheet around his neck. Other detainees in the cell alerted security personnel who immediately entered the cell, removed the bedsheet, and took the detainee to medical. Medical evaluated the detainee and cleared him to go back to the disciplinary segregation unit to the designated suicide watch cell. The detainee was placed on a continuous one-to-

one suicide watch. The detainee remained on watch until 6/26/2018. The detainee had no further mental health incidents and was removed from the facility 8/28/2018.

Since the last inspection, there was one ICE detainee death. A 56-year old Russian male was admitted to the facility on 6/27/2017. At the time of admission he provided a history of high blood pressure and seizures. The detainee's detention was unremarkable until 11/26/2018 when he complained of sudden on-set of severe abdominal pain. The detainee was transported to the hospital and admitted. Following an initial work-up, the detainee was assessed with a small bowel obstruction and intestinal bleeding. The detainee died in the hospital on 11/30/2019. OIG conducted an investigation. The facility has not received the results of the investigation.

The facility does not use Tasers. Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) is authorized for use by trained officers. Canines are used for contraband detection only and detainees are removed from the area prior to the search. There were 26 uses of force involving ICE detainees during this inspection period. All were immediate uses of force. Two incidents involved detainees fighting; nine incidents involved detainees who became aggressive with officers threatening to harm them and detainees who were throwing bodily waste at officers. Thirteen incidents involved detainees who refused to follow orders issued by officers and were disrupting the orderly operation of the facility. Two incidents involved detainees who were attempting to harm themselves and had to be restrained. OC was utilized in six of the incidents. There were eleven ICE detainees placed in the Emergency Restraint Chair (ERC). A review of the use-of-force incident reports indicated that all detainees who were sprayed with OC were decontaminated immediately and medical response was timely in all cases. None of the officers or detainees sustained any serious injuries. All incidents were reviewed by the chief of security and ICE and 25 incidents were determined to be within the guidelines of facility policy and the standard. In one incident it was determined that the force used was excessive and the officer was reprimanded and was required to attend remedial training. The detainee was not injured.

The facility reported three disturbances. One incident involved four female ICE detainees who were involved in a fight in the housing unit. The incident resulted in the aggressor being restrained. Two incidents involved male ICE detainees who refused to return to their cells for lockdown. Both incidents were resolved with no force being used.
